Great News! Persistence Pays off...

About 20 years ago, "descriptive video" was new and rapidly growing in popularity for people with limited vision. This format makes standard videos and movies accessible to people with a vision impairment. A narrator's voice is heard in breaks between voices and necessary audio. This voice describes visual content necessary to understand the story. For example, a male voice might be heard saying, "Good night Mr. and Mrs. Johnson! Thank you for a delicious dinner" followed by a narrator's voice saying, "As Colten leaves he is seen making a flirting wink at his boss's daughter." That last bit of information might be extremely important to the next phase of the drama but would be missed without good vision.

Paul saw the urgency of getting something Christian available in descriptive video (also called narrative video) as soon as possible. The Jesus Film folks and the Narrative Television Network people jumped on board and in a short time, the popular "Jesus Film" was available in descriptive format on VHS tapes.

Hundreds of tapes flew off the shelves or were picked up at conventions. In a very short time, the cartons were empty and DVDs were replacing VHS tapes.

However, for the past 15 years, all efforts to purchase the descriptive Jesus Film on DVD failed. The Jesus Film Project staff were not able to locate the descriptive version.

With low expectations, Paul recently tried one more time. To his surprise, he quickly received a positive reply. They found the video! He was told



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Email: blind@ag.org that they believed his story because of the consistent detail. They were convinced the format did exist. The staff worked together to dream up every possible "search" word for their database until they found the digital descriptive video.

Now comes the challenge of getting the video in the hands of people who do not know Christ and those who like the Apostle Paul, want to know Him better. Attending conventions and conferences of/and/for the Blind are expensive. They are the best places to meet unbelieving people with impaired vision.


